The manna ceased on the day they ate the produce of the land, and the Israelites no longer had manna; they ate the crops of the land of Canaan that year. - Joshua 5:12 (NRSV)

In the Promised Land, it turns out, there's no free lunch from heaven. God made manna rain down on the people just long enough to tide them over till they got to a place where they could do their part to provide for themselves. God gave the fertile land, and the people would now do the gathering, sowing, reaping, and all the rest to bring crops out of the ground and onto the table.

HEARING WITH FRESH EARS

Rev. Paul J. Allen IV Sermon: Jan. 23, 2022 Scripture Verses: Luke 4: 14-21

Jesus was going home. After his baptism and temptation in the desert, the beginning of his ministry, teaching in the synagogues, and now that his fame had spread throughout Galilee; Jesus was finally going home.

He must have been excited and probably expected a hero's welcome. He performed three miracles in three days: stopping the storm on the Sea of Galilee, healing the Woman cursed with bleeding, and then raising a young girl from the dead. Because of these miracles and his teaching, Jesus' fame was spreading and he was popular, even though this popularity would be short-lived.

So Jesus returned home, back to the people who knew his parents, his brothers and sisters, and those who helped him grow into a man. Wouldn't they be proud to see the boy they knew return as a successful Rabbi? Of all the locations where Jesus traveled, Nazareth was the most likely place where his message would be received. Surely his friends and neighbors would understand what he was called to proclaim.

And so Jesus went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, stood in front of his neighbors and relatives, took the scroll of the prophet Isaiah, and read from chapter 61.

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

He put down the scroll, turned to the crowd and stated, "Today, this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing."

At first the crowd seemed amazed. They asked each other, "Is this Joseph's son"? Is this the boy that we knew? There is no sense of sneering or contempt some seem delighted that one of their own was reading from their texts and saying the things that they wanted to hear. They thought they knew Jesus, but did they?

Luke wants us to clearly understand that the problem with Jesus' message is not between the old and the new, this is why Jesus read from the prophet Isaiah. Nor is the problem between the known and the unknown, he used a familiar scripture passage that the people would have heard time and time again. No, the problem the Nazarenes had with Jesus was between the known and the known, between the people of God and their memory. Jesus was preaching from familiar stories, but placing them in a new light, reminding the people that the day of the Lord is here, but that this day is not just for them, it is for the world.

He reminded his hometown that their sin was what separated them from God and often in Israel's history it was the outcast, the foreigner, or the socially unacceptable that understood God's message and did something about it.

Jesus knew what the people wanted to hear. They wanted to know that they would be okay, that soon God would redeem them, that they would not have the change, the world, and even God, would change for them. But this was not the truth.

The people thought they knew the meaning of the scriptures, just like they thought they knew Jesus, and they were wrong. They assumed Jesus that would tell them what they wanted to hear, but could not accept the truth when they heard it.

The church of today should listen very closely to Jesus' words. We need to hear this scripture lesson with fresh ears or we will fall into the same trap of the people of Nazareth. Because we also believe that we know Jesus. He is our friend, our comforter, our redeemer, our shepherd, the one who cares for us, loves us just as we are, and nurtures us in times of pain.

However there is another side of Jesus. The Jesus who overturned the tables at the temple and called the Pharisees a brood of vipers. The Jesus who cursed the fig tree and reminded the disciples of the hostility and pain they would endure when they took up their cross and followed him.

Sometimes the good news of Jesus does not sound like good news to us especially when we are reminded, like the people of Nazareth, that we are still sinful, still unworthy, and still struggling to understand the meaning and message of the Savior we follow.

Angry, confused, and hurt, the crowd took offense at his message. The keyword of this verse is offense. In Greek, it is "skandalon", or stumbling block, from which we get the word, "scandal." Jesus caused a scandal in his hometown by reading scripture and telling the people what they should have already known.

Soon the crowd became a mob that picked up Jesus and carried him outside of the village to throw him off a cliff. In just a few minutes the people of Nazareth

Jesus' neighbors, and friends, had become a part of the evil he was sent to overcome because they let their fear and hatred consume them.

Jesus slips away from this mob, we are not told how, and went his own way never returning to Nazareth. He knew that the people would not accept him again, because of their familiarity and fear.

Jesus' friends and neighbors were not prepared to hear that their understanding of God was flawed nor were they ready to accept this news from Jesus. They stayed mired in the past, remembering the child, clinging to their understanding of Yahweh, and hoping that God would act as they thought God should act.

They had put everything into a neat little box; Jesus was a confused local boy, God was their God alone, the Messiah would come to them, and the world would be as they wanted. They could not accept they were wrong.

They needed to hear the word of God again, with fresh ears and we need to hear the scriptures with the same. Dr. William Willoman tells a story about a young woman who heard a scripture passage from Matthew with fresh ears. "I had just preached as best I could on Matthew's story of the Laborers in the Vineyard, you know, the parable about how some workers came early, some came mid-day, some came late, and at the end of the day, they all were paid the same wage.

The Congregation filed out, but she lingered behind, wearing a blue usher's robe. "Where do you get these stories?" she asked.

I answered, "From growing up in South Carolina, I guess,"

"Well, I was troubled by your sermon today," she said.

"What troubled you?" I asked, in my usual nondefensive defensiveness. "I just don't think that's fair. I believe that people ought to be paid fairly for the work they do and I...."

"Wait!" I said. "That story is not original with me. That's from Matthew." "Matthew?" she asked. "Yea, Matthew. Like in the Bible?"

"Oh, sure, the Bible." She responded.

"You've never heard that story before? What is your religious background?" I asked, just praying to God she wouldn't say, "Methodist." She had not gone to church much, a bit as a kid, that's all.

"You know," I said, "I almost envy you. I have just preached a perfectly outrageous story and fifteen hundred people have filed out and told me it was a nice sermon. There is a sense in which you are the only one that got it, the only one to understand. Just for your information, the man who told that story was killed for telling it. Just after he told that story people got organized and killed him, but you got it."

Perhaps by listening with fresh ears we can get it too! Thanks be to God, Amen.



COVID-19 CHURCH PROTOCOLS

- •One 9:30 a.m. service will be offered at least through May 2022. First Christian Church offers virtual services (facebook.com/fcchsv, twitch.tv/fcchsv, or First Christian Church Huntsville on YouTube) every Sunday. While FCC and State recommendations are good benchmarks, we invite all people to worship with us based on their comfort level.
- •Enter the church through the Bell Tower Garden/ Narthex doors. The doors by the church office are locked.
- •Wearing face coverings/masks at all times inside the church is encouraged for everyone.
- Hand sanitizer and masks are available at the Lobby Welcome Table along with prepackaged communion elements.
- •The **nursery** is open for the 9:30 a.m. service and the 10:30 a.m. small group time.
- •Every other row of pews is roped off on the pulpit side of the sanctuary to allow individuals to practice social distancing so that they may worship at their level of comfort. The front section on the pulpit side is the least impacted zone with our heating and cooling system.
- •Attendees may vocalize during the service, such as stating the Lord's Prayer, litanies, etc., and sing hymns/ songs when lyrics are projected on the screens.
- •Offerings may be placed in the brass plate when exiting the sanctuary or sent by mail.
- •Coffee is temporarily suspended.
- •Small groups (including Sunday school classes) will meet at 8:30 a.m. or 10:30 a.m.
- Anyone with any symptoms will remain home and celebrate virtually for at least 10 days
- •Please notify the church office immediately if you develop symptoms after attending a service.
