THERE IS ROOM FOR YOU TOO by Chris Andrews

Have you ever been surprised by God? You expected God to work one way and God did the opposite, the unexpected? In the New Testament, God is constantly pulling surprises: God loves the most unlikely people, and shows up in the most unexpected places.

This is the message from Acts 10: 44-48. Perhaps a short Bible study will help us appreciate what is going on in today's reading. In the second chapter of Acts, we are confronted with the story of the birth of the church. We call it the Pentecost story. On the day of the Jewish festival of Pentecost something happened that no one expected. The Holy Spirit blew through the gathered community and caused quite a stir as people found themselves speaking in various languages and yet were able to understand what everyone was saying. It is a marvelous moment. Diverse groups of people are brought together through an unexpected visitation of the Holy Spirit and community is created.

However, this experience is a limited one. The gathered community is a community of Jews, the chosen people of God. It is Pentecost and the church has been fashioned by God's spirit. We celebrate this day every year in the liturgical cycle of the church. A lot happens after this dramatic visitation of God's spirit. The story is thrilling and I encourage you to read it for yourself in this early history of the church that we call the Acts of the Apostles.

In the tenth chapter of this book a different kind of Pentecost occurs. It has been called the "Gentile Pentecost" because here we have a record of the Holy Spirit visiting Gentiles, the non-Jews of that world. Now this is a surprise! No one expects God to act in this way. God is the God of the Jews. God's love is reserved for them. They are the people with the great faith tradition that begins with Abraham and continues through the exodus and the kings and prophets of the Old Testament. It would be only fitting that on the day of Pentecost God would do a special work like bringing the Spirit on the believers gathered at the sacred site of Jerusalem.

But God's spirit is always larger than our expectations. In Acts 10, that spirit confirms that God loves Gentiles too. The community of the excluded is included. The ones regarded as a "nonpeople" are elevated to the status of God's children. It is a surprise of monumental proportions! The early church is confronted with God's view and has to open its life and doors to all the people of the world. No longer can the church live in the comfort of fellowship with it's own. Now it must make room for all. It is a challenge and a blessing all at the same time.

Such is the story of the New Testament. Reading the Gospels and the Letters of this sacred text one becomes aware of one fact above all others: Jesus Christ is the friend of sinners, sufferers, and Samaritans! Just think about who gets noticed, who gets included in the story: Bartimaeus, the ten lepers, a man born blind, Zacchaeus, a hemorrhaging woman, an insane man living in a graveyard. Their names are legion. No "brightest and best" in this group. No power brokers, no names that graced the local social register, none of

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the king's palace advisors. These are the marginalized, the forgotten, and the overlooked. And God loves them all! This is the message of our text for today.

It is a reminder to us that Jesus is constantly moving toward those from whom others are moving away. And it is the good news that you, too, are included in the fellowship of the redeemed! No wonder we call this the gospel, which means, literally, "good news."

So here we are at church. We are an interesting group. We are the well behaved and the rebels. We are the righteous and the lost. We are the consistent and the inconsistent, the saints and the sinners. And, we all belong! Such is the grace of God that God's spirit of love reaches all.

I remember making a call many years ago to acknowledge someone's presence at our church. A woman had attended worship along with her children. I visited her home the following Monday hoping to see her and talk to her about our church. I wanted to invite her to come again and consider joining this community of faith. The woman was not at home, but her husband was. He and I had a pleasant visit at the front door. He told me his name was Bill. His wife's name was Betty. As I concluded my visit with Bill, I said, "Please tell Betty that we would love to have her visit our church again." And Bill said that he would. And then, as I turned to walk away, Bill called out, "And me too." And I said, "Of course . . . and you, too, Bill."

That scene has remained with me. "And you too, Bill." That is God's way. That is Jesus' example. That is the church when it is at its fullest with the inclusive spirit of the living God! Today the message comes to all of us: And you too! Surprise! There's room for you, too, in this place of sacred love. No wonder we call this the "good news" place!

Making a whip of cords, Jesus drove all of them out of the temple. - John 2:15 (NRSV)

What will Jesus find when he comes to visit us?

When Jesus came to the temple in Jerusalem, Jesus was displeased. He saw the bodies being sold in the temple yard. He saw the money changing hands. He saw and was viscerally revolted by the ways that the people had turned his Abba's house into a marketplace.

What Jesus found when he showed up to the temple was something. But it wasn't his. And it was so dangerous that he had to get everyone up out of there.

And they hated him for it. (This would get him executed, you see.)

But what he saw was so wrong. So out of pocket. So harmful. He had to do something.

The temple didn't turn into a marketplace without a series of failures taking place first. Leaders failed their people. They doubled down. They surely lied. They enriched themselves with the selling of bodies in the place of worship in the name of "sacrifice."

Jesus was having none of that. And they hated him for it.

But, there is such a thing as a course correction. There is a path to redemption.

It requires self-examination. It requires penitence – sincerely saying "I'm wrong, I'm sorry." It requires moving on. It requires looking around – maybe even in the mirror – and seeing if there are things in our surroundings that don't fit.

Only then can we step into our truth. And right the wrongs. And be who God put us on this planet to be.

Who and what is that? It's quite simple: we can decide that we will be a blessing. Or, at least, we can try.

SERMON TEXT SUNDAY, MAY 9, 2021

Rev. Paul J. Allen IV Sermon **Christ's Abiding Love** Scripture - John 15: 9-17

They say that imitation is the sincerest form of flattery. Now, I have never been sure who the "they" are, but I think that they might have been ministers because we are notorious for using the stories and ideas of others for our own lessons or sermons.

The simple fact is that all human beings imitate one another. We memorize and retell favorite jokes, look to celebrities and designers to see what to wear or how to style our hair, and utilize societal models to see how we are supposed to act toward one another.

The idea of learning by imitation is clearest in young children. This is how babies learn so rapidly; they imitate those who surround them, especially their parents. That is why Patti and I have always watched what we say around Abby and Joe. I heard enough horror stories from my parents or other ministers to realize that preacher's kids are notorious for saying the wrong thing at the wrong time.

Even Jesus realized the power of imitation in his ministry. He knew that the disciples and future Christians would need examples to follow, therefore, he taught in parables and provided models of how we are to live through his actions and words. Today's scripture passage is such an example.

The lesson for today is found in what is called Jesus' farewell discourse in the Gospel of John. This passionate prayer occurs before the Passover during the Last Supper and in many ways is a love letter to humankind so that we might know of the sacrificial love of Christ. That evening Jesus attempted to tell his apostles and followers what was going to happen in the days ahead, but he also called them to look to the future.

The lesson for today is the heart of this discourse because it speaks to the great commandment that Jesus gives us, tells us how we are to relate to others, and what our relationship will be with the risen Christ. Jesus tells the disciples that they are to abide in the love of God as evidenced through Jesus' presence on Earth. And how are the disciples to show this love, by following Jesus' commandments?

When we think of following commands we associate it with giving up control. In order to be commanded there has to be a leader and a follower, so we are putting ourselves in the subservient role and giving away our power to choose for ourselves. But this is not how Jesus sees it. He knew that following his commandments would bring us joy. But how?

First we have to understand the commandments that Jesus speaks of. He tells the disciples that his only commandment is to love one another as I have loved you. This idea sparks the imagination with its simplicity, but continues to challenge us every day. All of the other commandments are wrapped up in this idea, the understanding that God is love, Jesus in the incarnation of that love, and so as a response to this wondrous gift we are called to love one another.

However, once we begin to think about it, it seems an impossible task. How can we even begin to love others as Jesus loves us, how can we love people who injure our pride, rub us raw, or wish to destroy us?

Jesus does not stop just because we are uncomfortable, he goes further; no one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. Of course Jesus is reminding his followers of his coming death but there is more. His act of sacrifice on the cross becomes the definition of love for us. This is how we are called to love others, not friendly compassion or genial interest. We are called to care for others so much that we are willing to sacrifice ourselves for their sake.

The trouble is that we do not understand what sacrifice is. The concept is foreign because we have always been taught to look out for ourselves. We think that we can have our cake and eat it too, that we do not have to work or struggle for anything because we deserve success and expect to be happy.

We have seen in the past years what vanity, pride, and greed can do not just to a person or community but to a nation and the world as well. The decisions of a few have led to turmoil for the whole because no one wanted to think about the long term consequences or even began to contemplate how their actions would affect others.

As Christians, we are called to a better way. The core of the Christian faith is sacrificial love. We are called to imitate Jesus by giving up our delusions of power and sacrificing our lives of sin, so that we are reborn in the likeness of Christ.

I can remember the anticipation building as Patti and I were expecting our first child. This was something I had wanted my whole life, but I did not realize how it would change my life until we took Abby home and we were left alone with a small sleeping baby. I realized very quickly that she was dependent on me. My wants, my needs, my desires, all took a backseat to

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this tiny infant and how did she return this gift, with sticky kisses, squirming hugs and plenty of love.

That evening Jesus knew that his relationship with the disciples was changing. He told them I no longer consider you servants but friends and in doing so calls us friends and family as well. This is not the only way we know Jesus, but it holds an intimacy that was not present with God before.

God love us so much that we are friends, we are family, we are literally the body of Christ on earth, called to bear spiritual fruit, grow in faith, feed the spiritual needs of others, and love each other. So what is the ultimate expression of this intimacy and how can we realize it in a very human world?

Josiah Royce tried to imagine what this would look like but the best example he could come up with was the ideal church. Is there really such a thing? All too often churches follow the example of society and believe that their success is based on numbers, the size and beauty of their buildings, or the programs they provide. But the true strength of any church is the commitment of its members to Jesus' commandment to love one another.

Our mission is to spread the good news of Jesus Christ to the world, but how can we do this if we are not an example for others to follow. If we do not live in the image of Christ then our faith is empty, and others will not listen to us.

But, if we open ourselves to God, accept the mantle of loving servant leaders, and become a community that strives to reach out to others, then people will be attracted to the honesty of our mission and they will want to join us. That is the power of love, the ability to bring many different people together to serve the common good.

To many the great commandment seems impossible. Human beings are just not made to love everyone. It is a nice thought, good to teach the children in Sunday School, but when it comes down to it we barely tolerate others.

But the good news today and every day is that the resurrection of Jesus Christ provided a new example of how to live, work and love in the world. We did not choose Christ, Christ chose us and that means that we do not have to be afraid. Even though we feel like we cannot live up to the responsibilities set for us, even if we don't know if we can follow Jesus' commands, we know that God is in control and God will prevail in the end.

Today we celebrate Mother's Day. An expression of love for those women who have nurtured, provided for and cared for us. We can call many women in our lives mother because they embody the unconditional love of God. This is a part of being the church, living out what it means to be a family of faith.

The true church, the ultimate expression of love on earth, had already been created by the reality of Jesus Christ. We can gain access to this new creation by working with each other, supporting our sister churches in our community and world, and providing a place to worship and praise where the table is open and all people are welcome. Thanks be to God, Amen.

Sanctuary Service Protocols (Revised April 8)

- In person worship is at 9:30 a.m.
- Sunday school classes, the nursery, children/ youth gatherings, coffee, and other hospitality services are currently suspended.
- While FCC and the State recommendations are good benchmarks, we invite all people to worship with us based on their comfort lev-el. Virtual services are offered (facebook.com/fcchsv, twitch.tv/ fcchsv, or First Christian Church Huntsville on Youtube) every Sunday.
- Attendees, including children, will wear face coverings/masks inside the church and practice social distancing (6 feet apart for non-household members) for everyone's safety.
- Attendance is limited (approximately 75) to the ability to social distance.
- Enter the church through the Bell Tower Garden/ Narthex doors. The doors by the church office will be locked.
- Greeters will provide hand sanitizer to all who enter and provide masks for those who have not brought their own.
- No choir/congregational singing.
- Offerings may be placed in the brass plate when exiting the sanctuary or sent by mail.
- Anyone with any symptoms will remain home and celebrate virtually for at least 14 days.
- Notify the church office immediately if you develop symptoms after attending a service
