"DEAR DISCIPLES" Rev. Terri Hord Owens, May 28, 2021

Hello, Disciples. I hope that your Pentecost celebrations in worship were full of revival and fresh fire, fresh wind, to carry us forward into these still uncertain and unprecedented times.

Even as we see hope and light before us after 15 months of pandemic, we needed to be reminded that God was sending us a special Helper, a gift, Jesus said, someone who would help us to remember all that Jesus had taught. I read this week in my Bible study in the book of Joshua, the third chapter, as the children of Israel are on the edge of the river Jordan, preparing to cross over into Canaan.

God speaks to Joshua and says, "Have the priest to carry the Ark of the Covenant before the people and tell the people to follow it, because you have not passed this way before." What God was saying was, "Follow me. I know that you haven't been here before, but I am with you, and if you will just follow me, we will make that journey into that land of hope and light."

On Pentecost Sunday, Jesus' followers had been through a season of disruption and trauma. The resurrection had happened but they still weren't sure quite what was next. We've been through 15 months of pandemic. We have adjusted, and adapted, and continued to do ministry despite trauma and pain and the loss of so much life. The devastation of so many parts of our economy. The violence that still continues to plague our country.

But we are now seeing a point where restrictions are being lifted. More of us are being vaccinated. We're asking the questions, "Can we be in the same room together, mask or no mask? In person on the parking lot? Hybrid worship? Still online? Lord, what shall we do?" I want to point you back to that edge of the river Jordan, where God says, "Follow me, because you've not been here before." God knows, church, that we have need of God's guidance. God also knows that we are so capable of bearing witness to God's limitless love.

I invite you to just stay with God. Continue to pray. Continue to spend time with the Holy. Continue to engage that sacred text so that you will immerse yourself in God's presence, remembering all that Jesus taught. Filled with that fresh fire and fresh power from on high, there are still a ways to go. There is still a new place to which we must travel as church, a new church, with the courage to imagine who we must be how we must serve, how we shall live in this new time and space.

I'm encouraged because I'm reminded that God knows that we have not passed this way before. So let's follow God. Let's stay with God. Let's be with God as we move forward into hope and light, filled and encouraged, emboldened and inspired by the very Spirit and presence of God. Let's go, church. We've not passed this way before, but God is with us, and we must simply follow where God leads. My prayer for you is that you will hear. You will follow. God loves you, Disciples. God loves you, and so do I.



NEW COVID-19 PROTOCOLS (APPROVED MAY 22)

- Fully vaccinated individuals may choose to attend with or without masks.
- Attendees who are not fully vaccinated, and children who are able, will continue to wear face coverings/masks inside the church until further notice.
- There will be only one 9:30 a.m. service offered for the next 12 months. First Christian Church offers virtual services (facebook.com/fcchsv, twitch.tv/fcchsv, or First Christian Church Huntsville on YouTube) every Sunday. While FCC and State recommendations are good benchmarks, we invite all people to worship with us based on their comfort level.
- Hand sanitizer and masks are available for those who have not brought their own.
- Prepackaged communion elements are available in the Narthex.
- The **nursery is open** for the 9:30 a.m. service and the 10:30 a.m. small group time.
- Attendance is limited (approximately 75) to the ability to social distance (6 feet apart for nonhousehold members). Every other pew will be roped off for social distancing.
- **Members may vocalize** during the service, such as stating the Lord's Prayer, litanies, etc., sing the Doxology within the service.
- Offerings may be placed in the brass plate when exiting the sanctuary or sent by mail.
- Food, coffee, and other hospitality services remain suspended until further notice.
- Small groups (including Sunday school classes) are meeting in person at 8:30 a.m. or 10:30 a.m.
- An Intergenerational Small Group class for children, youth, and any adults that wish to attend will meet at 10:30 a.m. beginning June 6 and continuing through August.
- Anyone with any symptoms will remain home and celebrate virtually for at least 14 days.
- Please notify the church office immediately if you develop symptoms after attending a service.

Don't Forget Us by Martha Spong

The Lord will fulfill God's purpose for me; your steadfast love, O Lord, endures forever. Do no forsake the work of your hands. - Psalm 138:8 (NRSV)

I grew up Baptist, so my idea of prayer was your own words you strung together with a particular purpose in mind – whether to ask for something, or to ask forgiveness for something, or to ask for something for someone else, or to thank God for any or all of the above. Six years in Episcopal school exposed me to repeated forms of prayer, including confessions and petitions and praise, all sounding like poetry. Bits and phrases still live in my head half a century later. They are words to pray when I don't have my own words.

The psalms were written for that purpose, to put prayers into a form that a community or an individual might use, and they often end with a word of trust in God — that God hears, or God cares, or God will act. This closing verse of Psalm 138 is doing a lot of that work. It's saying, "There must be a reason why I'm here," and "God never stops loving," and, just in case, "Please, don't forget me."

We need these good prayers, in our words or in the psalmist's, for all the moments when we believe but also worry about what's happening around us, or how we fit into what God wants for the world. This past year plus raised those concerns and questions for me daily.

Is your idea of prayer the words in a book, or the words that stream from your heart to your mouth, or something else?

When you need words and don't have them, try these.

Prayer

Holy God, we trust that you have a purpose for us, and you will never stop loving us. (Please, don't forget us.) Amen.
