LEARNING TO PRAY

I still remember, when I was a child, when my father taught me how to pray. As the son of two ministers going to church was just a natural part of my life, it is something we did every Sunday and often times during the week. I also went to Sunday School, Vacation Bible School and Church Camp and I am sure there were lessons on prayer at these events, but the lesson I remember most clearly came from the dinner table.

When my family sat down to eat we would pray before every meal. We had a small table in the back of the kitchen where we would have our family meals, we would only eat in the dining room if we had company over. When the food was ready we sat down, my father would ask us to bow our heads and we would pray. I can remember as a child being impatient, I was hungry and ready to eat, and while my father did not pray long, it seemed to take a long time to me.

Then the day came when my father asked me to pray for the food. This was a big responsibility and I remember feeling anxious and scared. Would my prayer be right? Would I mess up in some way? Would my parents be mad at me? Would God be mad at me? My father could see I was uncomfortable so he said, "I will pray tonight, but tomorrow we will pray together." That night he taught me a simple grace, "God is great, God is good, let us thank him for our food. By his hands we all are fed. Thank you Lord for daily bread. Amen." I would bet that many of you know this prayer, or at least a version of this prayer.

I still remember it to this day, in fact, I taught my children this prayer and sometimes we use it when we pray for meals. It is simple, direct, and has the elements a prayer of thanksgiving needs. Who are we praying for, God who is great and good. Giving thanks for the gifts we have been given and recognizing it is God who provides them. There is even a final element asking for a specific need, our daily bread. There are many different types of prayer, asking for healing and comfort, prayers of petition, intercession, giving thanks, and praise just to name a few and it is important to understand that God does not need our prayers to be overly embellished or flowery. One of the best lessons on prayer I ever heard, gave me a simple, one word prayer that I used daily, "Help."

We do not need to be anxious about praying, rather our prayers should be a simple and honest conversation with God. Even if we ramble, even if they do not make sense, even if we do not know what to say, God is listening and God will respond, sometimes in ways we do not expect. God wants us to pray, God wants to hear from us, and then God calls us to respond in the world making the love of Christ a reality for others. Thanks be to God for the gift of prayer, Amen.

Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. - Romans 8:26 (NRSV)

“Pastor, would you pray the doctor hits the bull’s eye with my injection?” Of course I will.

“I don’t really know what to pray for; I’m so confused.” Let’s talk to God together anyway.

Myths about prayer seem to abound and rebound. One myth is that the Rev’s prayers have more effect. Another is that God needs explicit instructions from us in prayer. If we don’t know say the right thing, how will God know what to do?


More often than not, whether we admit it or not, “we do not know how to pray as we ought.” Our prayers seem selfish or rambling. Will God stay on the other end of the line if I don’t get to the point or it’s all about me?

Paul says we have help – not only for the times we know we don’t know, but for the times when we think we do. The Holy Spirit knows that among our weaknesses is a felt need to educate God.

Words, the Apostle Paul says, are not even essential to prayer. Not for us, and not for the Holy Spirit. The Spirit knows the “will of God” (Romans 8:27) and translates our prayers accordingly. God knows what we say and is attuned to our wordless sighs.

God, thank you today that you are not only still speaking, you’re still listening. Even when I don’t know what to say. Amen.



NEW COVID-19 PROTOCOLS

(APPROVED JUNE 10)

- **Enter the church through the Bell Tower Garden/Narthex doors.** The doors by the church office will be locked.
- **Fully vaccinated individuals may choose to attend with or without masks.**
- **Attendees who are not fully vaccinated, and children who are able, will continue to wear face coverings/masks inside the church until further notice.**
- There will be only **one 9:30 a.m. service** offered for the next 12 months. First Christian Church offers virtual services ([facebook.com/fcchsv](https://www.facebook.com/fcchsv), [twitch.tv/fcchsv](https://www.twitch.tv/fcchsv), or First Christian Church Huntsville on YouTube) every Sunday. While FCC and State recommendations are good benchmarks, we invite all people to worship with us based on their comfort level.
- Hand sanitizer and masks are available for those who have not brought their own.
- Prepackaged communion elements are available in the Narthex.
- The **nursery is open** for the 9:30 a.m. service and the 10:30 a.m. small group time.
- Attendance is limited (approximately 85) to the ability to social distance (6 feet apart for non-household members). Every other pew will be roped off for social distancing.
- **Members may vocalize** during the service, such as stating the Lord's Prayer, litanies, etc., sing the Doxology within the service.
- Offerings may be placed in the brass plate when exiting the sanctuary or sent by mail.
- Food, coffee, and other hospitality services remain suspended until further notice.
- **Small groups** (including Sunday school classes) are meeting in person at **8:30 a.m. or 10:30 a.m.**
- An **Intergenerational Small Group** class for children, youth, and any adults that wish to attend will meet at 10:30 a.m. beginning June 6 and continuing through August.
- Anyone with any symptoms will remain home and celebrate virtually for at least 14 days.
- Please notify the church office immediately if you develop symptoms after attending a service
