ALABAMA AND NORTHWEST FLORIDA CHRISTIAN WOMEN'S MINISTRIES (CWM) REGIONAL PROJECTS

CWM has 2 projects that we are asking you support this month. One is The Wellhouse (TW).

Interstate I 20 from Atlanta to Birmingham is considered the sex trafficking Super Highway. Female victims that are rescued are provided medical, spiritual, mental and emotional care. Programs offered include: 24/7 crisis line, trauma center, immediate shelter, long-term recovery program, transitional living apartment community for grads of their programs. We Belong to Each Other by Marchaé Grair *How very good and pleasant it is when kindred live together in unity!* - Psalm 133:1

When I was in high school, I was selected to go on a leadership trip in Washington, D.C. My mom couldn't afford to send me. She was a single parent, and it was too expensive for her to buy me a roundtrip plane ticket and pay a hefty tuition.

The Sunday after I received the invitation, our small but mighty church passed a collection plate and collected enough money to send me on the trip. This was not a group of wealthy people for whom a donation meant no sacrifice. But they saw a person they loved in need and knew that, collectively, they could do something about it.

They decided I belonged to them and they belonged to me. They decided that because they were my village, they would do what they could, and they had faith that it would be enough.

I have channeled the memory of that collection plate often, especially when I'm broke and feel as if my offering is too small. There have been times when a couple of dollars was all I could give, and I almost let the embarrassment about the amount of the gift stop me from giving at all.

And then I remember how that collection plate changed my life. And it wasn't because of how much each person gave, it was because of the spirit with which they gave it.

Giving isn't about who has the most money or who can give the biggest offering. We give so that people can feel a tangible impact of our love for God and for one another. Giving is a concrete declaration that we belong to each other.

And belonging to each other means that we give what we can, when we can, to support the collective good of the church.

Prayer; How good it is to belong, O God! How glad I am to offer my support and love so that others know they belong, too.

Sanctuary Service Protocols

- There is only one 9:30 a.m. Sunday service offered currently. Virtual services will continue with live streaming and recorded services uploaded to social media platforms.
- Sunday school classes, the nursery, and youth gatherings are temporarily suspended.
- Food, coffee, and other hospitality services are also suspended.
- High risk members and families with children unable to reliably social distance are encouraged to remain home for virtual services offered on <u>facebook.com</u>, <u>twitch.tv</u>, or <u>youtube.com</u>
- Attendance is limited (approximately 75) to the ability to social distance and the service will be broadcast (107.9) to the parking lot in the event of overflow attendance.
- Attendees will wear face coverings/masks inside the church and practice social distancing (6 feet apart for non-household members) for everyone's safety.
- Bring your own communion elements (we have prepackaged if you forget or do not have them).
- Enter the church through the Bell Tower Garden/ Narthex doors. The doors by the church office will be locked.
- Greeters will provide hand sanitizer to all who enter and provide masks for those who have not brought their own.
- Every other pew is roped off for social distancing.
- Ushers will seat people down the center/side aisles
- No choir/congregational singing.
- Following the service, rows will leave by the side aisles with the east aisle exiting through Family Services and west aisle through the Narthex doors. (There will be directional signs.)
- Offerings may be placed in the brass plate when exiting the sanctuary or sent by mail.
- Please, **no congregating indoors** before or after service social distancing outdoors.
- Anyone with any symptoms will remain home and celebrate virtually for at least 14 days.
- Notify the church office immediately if you develop symptoms after attending a service.
