Sanctuary Service Protocols

- In person worship is at 9:30 a.m.
- Sunday school classes, the nursery, and youth gatherings are temporarily suspended.
- Food, coffee, and other hospitality services are also suspended.
- High-risk members and families with children unable to reliably social distance are encouraged to remain home for virtual services offered on facebook.com/fcchsv, twitch.tv/fcchsv, or search First Christian Church Huntsville on youtube.com
- Attendance is limited (approximately 75) to the ability to social distance and the service will be broadcast (107.9) to the parking lot in the event of overflow attendance.
- Attendees will wear face coverings/masks inside the church and practice social distancing (6 feet apart for non-household members) for everyone's safety.
- Enter the church through the Bell Tower Garden/Narthex doors. The doors by the church office will be locked.
- Greeters will provide hand sanitizer to all who enter and provide masks for those who have not brought their own.
- Ushers will seat people down the center/side aisles
- No choir/congregational singing.
- Following the service, rows will **leave by the side aisles** with the east aisle exiting through Family Services and the west aisle through the Narthex doors. (There will be directional signs.)
- Offerings may be placed in the brass plate when exiting the sanctuary or sent by mail.
- Please, **no congregating indoors** before or after service social distancing outdoors.
- Anyone with any symptoms will remain home and celebrate virtually for at least 14 days.
- Notify the church office immediately if you develop symptoms after attending a service.

My friend Mike is the cofounder of The Repurpose Project in Gainesville, Florida, "a creative reuse center, a.k.a. weird thrift store." The goal of the shop is to support a "used economy," avoiding the costs—to consumers and to the planet of creating new products.

It's part sliding-scale general store, where folks with low incomes can find what they need at a bargain. Part architectural salvage, where residents can imagine new homes from old. Part studio space, where artists create beautiful installation pieces. Part playroom, where kids and grown -ups can grab glue guns and bring something fun to life from the world's largest junk drawer.

It is all a little bit of heaven.

Revelation gives a vision of a new heaven and a new earth. But Isaiah is more sustainable. He offers the people a used heaven and a used earth.

Bins of swords are dug out from behind the old 45s and turned into plows. Rusty spears are untangled from the nest of cell phone chargers and shaped into hooks. The tools of war are put to better use at a bargain price.

It would be a shame to just throw them out, given all they've cost us.

And considering the energy that's gone into making them, the users too, get repurposed by their creator. Glued back together for new life.

Imagine. Us sword-lifters and war-learners, put back to work as farmers and urban gardeners. A little bit of heaven.
