#### SPECIAL OFFERING FOR THE ALABAMA-NORTHWEST FLORIDA REGION

In addition to its more than 3,200 congregations and its General Ministries, the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) expresses itself in 31 geographic areas called Regions. The Regions cover every part of the United States and Canada. The primary nature of Regional Ministries is to look after the congregations in their regions. Regions have two main purposes: nurture and mission. They are called to fulfill the mission of the Church by taking the lead in developing new forms of ministry in mission, witness and service. Regions also are nurturing agents that provide support, guidance and pastoral care to ministers and congregations.

Additionally, Regions play the role of counselor and advisor in matters such as the standing and credentialing of ministers, relocation of pastors, and filling vacant ministerial positions, among other responsibilities. Regions help find interim ministers for churches that are without full-time pastors.

Regional ministers often serve as mentors to congregational pastors. They offer training to clergy and laity and assistance in cases of difficulties between ministers and congregations. Regions call their staffs, own and manage their own property, determine their budgets and administer regional finances within their available resources. They hold regional assemblies and develop procedures for seeking counsel from the Office of General Minister and President. Regions may vary in size and shape. They share equal standing with general and congregational ministries.

Regional ministry includes connecting people who help connect other people to Jesus. Through this connection with our region our congregation, together with other congregations in our Region, organize summer church camps, call and equip pastors and other church leaders, and share stories of what God is doing within and beyond our walls. Our support makes this work possible.

Imagine how many people have come to faith and will come to faith in Jesus because so many Disciples in our Region, and throughout the world, are continually working together developing new ways to invite new generations to meet Jesus and help them to grow in their faith! In the weeks ahead we bring an extra gift in honor of those who first told us about the newborn King. As we do this, we help our Region continue connecting and supporting those who will share that Good News with children, youth and adults in the coming year. I hope you will support the work of the Alabama-Northwest Florida region as it builds the family of God. Amen.

#### **Sanctuary Service Protocols**

- In person worship is at 9:30 a.m.
- Sunday school classes, the nursery, and youth gatherings are temporarily suspended.
- Food, coffee, and other hospitality services are also suspended.
- First Christian Church offers virtual services (facebook.com/fcchsv, twitch.tv/fcchsv, or First Christian Church Huntsville on Youtube.) every Sunday. While FCC and State recommendations are good benchmarks, we invite all people to worship with us based on their comfort level. We ask all members and children to wear masks.
- Attendance is limited (approximately 75) to the ability to social distance and the service will be broadcast (107.9) to the parking lot in the event of overflow attendance.
- Attendees will wear face coverings/masks inside the church and practice social distancing (6 feet apart for non-household members) for everyone's safety.
- Enter the church through the Bell Tower Garden/ Narthex doors. The doors by the church office will be locked.
- Greeters will provide hand sanitizer to all who enter and provide masks for those who have not brought their own.
- Ushers will seat people down the center/side aisles
- No choir/congregational singing.
- Following the service, rows will leave by the side aisles with the east aisle exiting through Family Services and the west aisle through the Narthex doors. (There will be directional signs.)
- Offerings may be placed in the brass plate when exiting the sanctuary or sent by mail.
- Please, no congregating indoors before or after service - social distancing outdoors.
- Anyone with any symptoms will remain home and celebrate virtually for at least 14 days.
- Notify the church office immediately if you develop symptoms after attending a service.

### BURNING FOR CHRISTMAS BY MATTHEW LANEY

Since all these things are to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be, waiting for the coming day of God, because of which the heavens will be set ablaze and dissolved, and the elements will melt with fire? But, in accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home.

2 Peter 3:11-13 (NRSV)

As a child, I received two vastly different messages about forest fires: 1) forest fires are bad, and 2) forest fires are good.

On the one hand, Smokey the Bear told me "Only you can prevent forest fires!" And I believed him. I had the power not to play with matches anywhere, especially in the woods. If I went camping, I learned where and how to safely build, tend, and extinguish a campfire.

On the other hand, I also learned that forest fires play an important role in our ecosystem. They clear out dead wood that would take much longer to break down. Forest fires replenish the soil and provide nutrition for the next generation of trees and plants. Some species of trees actually depend on fire to germinate their seeds. Many creatures are very at home in scorched forests.

With all due respect to Smokey, 2 Peter's vision is more attuned to the value of holy fire to clear out the dead wood, replenish the soil, and germinates seeds of the new heavens and the new earth where righteousness is at home.

The real burning question in this passage is: "What sort of person ought you to be" while we wait for the fire to be kindled: pessimistic or hopeful, grumpy or grateful? Will we see the fire as the end of the world, or the beginning of another? What in your life needs to burned up or melted down to make way for new life?

**Prayer** - Fiery Spirit of the Living God, fall afresh on me. Melt me. Mold me. Fill me. Use me.
