#### WHERE DID HE GO?

Rev. Paul J. Allen IVSermon Dec. 26, 2021Scripture Verses:Luke 2: 41-52

Patti and I tend to shop in very different ways. I do not like to go shopping so when I am forced to go I know exactly what I want and where I need to go to get it. In fact, in my head, I even plan out my route so I can get in the store, grab whatever it is I am looking for, get to the checkout quickly, and leave so I can get on with my life.

When Patti goes shopping she enters the store with a general idea of what she needs. Then she travels the isles looking for what fits those needs and picking up items that catch her attention. I can send Patti out to the store for bread and milk and she ends up being gone for an hour, returning with several bags, and stories about how much money she saved.

Therefore, since Patti and I have such different shopping styles, when we end up going together there are usually problems. You might say that Patti is a wanderer and I like to stay on course, therefore, I tend to lose track of Patti in the shuffle.

One minute we are walking together around frozen foods and the next minute I find myself alone in canned foods and I have to begin the process of looking for my wife. I oftentimes wonder what the stockers at Wal-Mart think as I wander around the store desperately searching for my wife. There is nothing more pathetic than a lost husband searching the store for a lost loved one. Of course, Patti is not lost, she knows exactly where she is; you might say that I am the one who has lost her.

I wonder if Mary and Joseph felt the same way when they were looking for Jesus after their trip to Jerusalem? Every year the Law of Moses required all observant male Jews to journey to Jerusalem for Passover. Therefore, Joseph was required to travel to the holy city for this celebration. It is interesting to note that Mary and Jesus were not required to go, but perhaps because of their faith, or their desire to stay together as a family unit, they traveled with Joseph to celebrate the holy day. But as they began their journey home Mary and Joseph could not find Jesus. At first, they just assumed that he was with the group of travelers going with them. At that time families or neighborhood units would often travel together for safety. Mary and Joseph must have thought that Jesus was with family or friends, safe and secure.

Yet, as they continued to search they found that Jesus was not with any of them. He was nowhere to be found. Can you imagine their panic? Where was Jesus, was he injured or hurt, could someone have taken him, what had happened to their son?

Eventually they realized that he must still be in Jerusalem and so they returned and searched the town for three days. Three days, they must have been going crazy.

My mother has told me how scary it is to lose your child for a few minutes. When I was younger she lost track of me in a supermarket. I was about four or five and I decided to play hide and seek with her. I must have done a good job because she did not notice my absence until she was at the checkout.

She spent several minutes looking for me and finally got the manager to call for me on the intercom. I thought that this was just all fun and games, but my mother was terrified. I can only imagine the fear Mary and Joseph must have felt after three days.

Finally, Jesus' parents found him at the temple. He was sitting with the teachers of the law listening and asking them questions. Jesus had been at the temple the whole time learning and teaching. The author of Luke tells us that all who heard Jesus were amazed at his understanding and his answers.

Jesus was still considered a child. He had not gone through his Bar mitzvah, but he was accepted and heard in the temple. Jesus was judged not by his age, but by his faith, understanding, and desire to learn.

His parents must have been relieved, but furious. Mary asks him, "Child, why have you treated us this way? Your father and I have been looking for you for days, you had us so worried."

Jesus simply answers, "Why were you looking for me, I was not lost, I was right where I should be, in my Father's house." Indeed Jesus was not lost, he knew where he was, be didn't know his parents were looking for him; he only knew he was where he needed to be.

Now before you think that this story is implausible, think about this. Have you ever lost someone you love, left a child in a store, or forgot to pick up your spouse after work? Sometimes you have no clue as to why you forgot them or lost your way, you just did.

I think I have told this story before but once, during a trip in North Carolina I left Patti stranded at a rest stop. This was before we had kids, and cell phones. We had stopped to rest our legs and get a drink during a long journey. To this day I still have no clue as to what I was thinking, but I got my drink, took a look at the map, walked to the car, and drove away. It took me a few minutes to understand that something, or someone, was missing.

When I realized what I had done I hurried back to the rest stop, but that meant getting off the highway, getting back on again, and turning around again so I would be on the right side of the highway for the rest stop. It took about 20 minutes. I thought Patti would be furious, but as I drove to the station I saw her in front of the building laughing. She had realized what had happened and had just gone back into the rest area to wait for me. She told me that she knew that I would come back to get her. Who else could I get to iron my shirts? Once again I lost track of Patti, she was where she was supposed to be, but I lost her.

Everyone loses things; we can even lose people. Our lives become busy and complicated, to the point where our needs and wants come before everything or everyone else. It is all too easy to turn our backs on friends, family, even the church when our selfish needs blind us to the concerns of others. Sometimes we can lose faith and lose our connection with Christ as well.

Like Mary and Joseph when a crisis occurs we search all over for where we assume Jesus will be,

but when we cannot find his presence we become angry and confused.

We ask ourselves, why would Jesus do this? Doesn't he know that this is the time that I need his most, why is he treating me like this? We search until we are exhausted, and lose hope.

But Christmas is a reminder that Christ is with us always. When we lose sight of Jesus it is not because he is lost or not with us, it is because we lose him.

We travel down the wrong path, we assume what he wants without taking the time to understand if it is His will or ours, or we walk away without looking back and in doing so we believe, wrongly, that the fault is with Jesus.

Only after we realize that Christ is not lost, that he is right where he is supposed to be, in our hearts and our lives working with us, can we truly know of the love and graciousness of God.

When we lose faith, when we lose Christ, our Lord is not stagnant. Rather he searches for us, forgives our misplaced anger and fear, and reunites us with our fellow brothers and sisters so that once again we might be one within the fellowship of faith.

At this time, like Mary, we can treasure our knowledge of Jesus in our hearts for we know that we are never alone, never lost, and never abandoned. We are bound with bonds that cannot be broken, bound in a covenantal relationship with God that cannot even be defeated in death.

The community of faith that we are worshiping in today is a response to the grace, love, and unity that we find through Christ Jesus. This spirit of faith is not lost to us; rather it only needs to be discovered again.

We have found the joy of community. We know the true power of Christians working together in a spirit of love. Now let us share this understanding with the world, so that no one will think of themselves as lost, but will understand that they are all a part of the family of God.

Thanks be to God. Amen.

#### **COVID-19 CHURCH PROTOCOLS**

(Approved by the Board on October 14.)

- One 9:30 a.m. service will be offered at least through May 2022. First Christian Church offers virtual services (facebook.com/fcchsv, twitch.tv/ fcchsv, or First Christian Church Huntsville on YouTube) every Sunday. While FCC and State recommendations are good benchmarks, we invite all people to worship with us based on their comfort level.
- Enter the church through the Bell Tower Garden/Narthex doors. The doors by the church office are locked.
- Wearing face coverings/masks at all times inside the church is encouraged for everyone.
- Hand sanitizer and masks are available at the Lobby Welcome Table along with prepackaged communion elements.
- The **nursery** is open for the 9:30 a.m. service and the 10:30 a.m. small group time.
- Every other row of pews is roped off on the pulpit side of the sanctuary to allow individuals to practice social distancing so that they may worship at their level of comfort. The front section on the pulpit side is the least impacted zone with our heating and cooling system.
- Attendees may vocalize during the service, such as stating the Lord's Prayer, litanies, etc., and sing hymns/songs when lyrics are projected on the screens.
- Offerings may be placed in the brass plate when exiting the sanctuary or sent by mail.
- Food, coffee, and other hospitality services remain suspended until further notice.
- Small groups (including Sunday school classes) will meet at 8:30 a.m. or 10:30 a.m.
- Anyone with any symptoms will remain home and celebrate virtually for at least 14 days.
- Please notify the church office immediately if you develop symptoms after attending service.
