FOUND FAITHFUL

I came across this illustration from an article written by Beryl Jantzi from the Mennonite Church U.S.A.

King Henry III lived in Germany long ago. The king grew tired of his royal duties, so he applied to a monastery to become a monk. The religious superior of the monastery said to Henry, "Your Majesty, do you understand that to join this monastery you must become obedient to me as your religious superior? That will be hard because you have been king."

Henry replied, "I understand. The rest of my life I will be obedient to you, as Christ leads you."

"Then I will tell you what to do," said the leader of the monastery. "Go back to your throne and serve faithfully in the place where God has placed you."

This is exactly what King Henry did. When King Henry died, this statement was written about him: "The king learned to rule by being obedient."

We too can tire of our responsibilities. Like King Henry we need to be reminded that God has called us and equipped us to be faithful in our unique roles – be it as a plumber, accountant, mother, father, pastor, or teacher. God expects us to be faithful in our relationships with each other as well as with our resources.

The story about King Henry and what he learned about being faithful to his call has implications for each of us today. Jesus taught us that faithfulness starts with the simple and everyday things of life. If each day's activities are a letter written to God, it should be our goal to sign off each night with the words, "Faithfully Yours."

We are called to live right where we are, but to live in a way being faithful stewards of what resources God has provided to us. A Sunday ago the Gospel lectionary scripture has Jesus telling us, (Luke 16:10–13 NRSV) 10 "Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. 11 If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? 12 And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? 13 No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

Wow, that says a lot that may be hard for us to hear. I believe it means we should not allow the love, or perhaps lust, for wealth and money to drive our life. Who is a slave to whom? Are you a faithful steward of what God has provided for your life or are you a slave to your money and wealth? Serving God faithfully means leading a life of obedience to God. It's pretty clear to me the Biblical faithful standard to be obedient to God with our wealth is 10% giving, a tithe and that is only a beginning.

Right now we are setting our church budget for the new year. The various committee chairs are being asked to send in their budget requests. This will take awhile, but it is very important. My hope is that living as disciples of Christ we are willing to be obedient to God with whatever we are entrusted with and be transformed into the image of Christ as good stewards of how God has greatly blessed us. Can I hear an Amen?

REPORT OF FIRST SMALL MEETINGS WITH THE BUILDING COMMITTEE

Two meetings have been held. We discussed the congregational meeting, the bidding process to get actual costs, and reviewed all of the presentation charts used at the Congregational Meeting. Next, six renovation options were identified, possible funding programs were described, and information on the line of credit which might be needed if the congregation in November selects a renovation option which exceeds the current funding available in the bank account in November. On August 31 the account was at \$501,793.

CWM, THE NEAVES-DAVIS CENTER, AND YOU

The October CWM project is financial support for the Neaves-Davis Center (also known as the D-Home). The Center opened many years ago when a group of citizens (including former FCC member, Nancy Erskine) were concerned that youth in legal trouble were housed in the adult jail; a juvenile center was then built. Funds are used to purchase items such as books for the Center's library, educational games, equipment for the gymnasium, and computer programs. The average age of the 20 children typically in the Center is 15 ½ with an average stay of 17 days. Our monetary donations can help provide positive activities for the teens and expose them to alternate ways to spend their time. This is a program that is often neglected in our community and where we can make a difference.
