RUDOLPH AND JESUS

Back in 1938 the author of "Rudolph, The Red Nosed Reindeer," Robert May, was an advertising copywriter for Montgomery Ward. His boss said, "I want you to write a folk story for a catalogue booklet this year. We've been buying these little Christmas books for children each year, but now we are going to put out our own to save money. Write us a good story."

The man had a child at home and his wife dying with a terminal illness. He felt little inspiration for such a task. It was only an additional burden on an already heavy load. He paced about his small office and worried. Finally, he had this dream of writing about reindeer and after several failures he finally revised his story.

Robert May read his revised script to his dying wife and child. The child's eyes began to sparkle. The author poured his own inferiority, his own sense of failure into the character of Rudolph. The struggle of the author's life was cast into the story of the rednosed reindeer. You know the rest of the story (as Paul Harvey might say) ... "Rudolph with your nose so bright, won't you guide my sleigh tonight!"

Rudolph had this very shinny nose, a hidden asset, but all the other reindeer laughed at him and made fun of him. Every parent knows the pain when their child is the recipient of such cruel activity. The pain of the child becomes the pain of the parent. The reindeer obviously didn't like Rudolph's inherent worth as an individual UNTIL it was proved that the "disability" of that red nose could actually be useful. Rudolph was not accepted until he had done something heroic for the others, and then in spite of all his apparent oddities, and differences, Rudolph is accepted. The song says it all, "then, all the other reindeer loved him ..."

Why is it that the world cannot see that there is inherent, God-granted worth in each individual regardless of what they can or cannot do? Why does the world withhold its love UNTIL value is proven and affirmed by the Santas and various authority figures of this world? Isn't it true that we are of worth because of who we are and not what we do?

Thanks be to God that Christmas is the season wherein God affirms our worth amidst our weakness and humanity. We are accepted and loved by God not because of "how brightly our nose shines in the darkness" or what we can ultimately do and offer.

God came to earth at Christmas in the form of human flesh not because we were worthy of that coming, but rather in spite of the fact we were unworthy. God came in the form of a baby and died for us on the cross because of *who God is*. There must be some **connection between red noses and blood stained nail pierced hands**. Why not discover what it is this Christmas season?

Reach out this Christmas and love someone, not because of what they have done for you, but because of who they are in God's sight. Allow someone to join in "your reindeer games" *before* they are affirmed by some white-bearded, jolly man in a red suit as being of "utilitarian value."

God certainly has affirmed your value before you proved yourself. Isn't that what the Incarnation and the Cross is all about? God's way is to offer **unconditional love**, not love that is based on how one might benefit the giver of that love. The practice of such love can truly make this Christmas the Mass of Christ's Presence in your life.
