# WHO, ME WORRY?

I came across this devotional by Graham Hardy and I like it a lot. It sure has a lot to say. See what you think.

The United States Public Health Service once made the following comment on the prevalence of nervous disease and tendency of worry to weaken and shorten life.

"No bird ever tried to build more nests than his neighbor. No fox ever fretted because he had only one hole in which to hide. No squirrel ever died of anxiety lest he should not lay by enough for two winters instead of one. No dog ever lost any sleep over the fact that he had not enough bones laid aside for his declining years."

Most of us waste a lot of nervous energy worrying about troubles that will never happen. We are like the little old lady who said, "I always feel bad when I feel good, for I know that I will feel bad after a while."

Worry has been described as "interest paid on trouble before it falls due." Such prodigal waste in the financial world would be unthinkable, but how many are wasting nervous energy on worries that are entirely unproductive, except in ulcers and hypertension.

Remember Mark Twain who said that he had known a lot of troubles in his life, but most of then never happened. The worrier creates problems because his thinking is distorted, his attitudes unbalanced.

Let's make it a top priority to break this habit of worry once and for all, and we'll add 10 years to our life. Look squarely at your problems. Make sure they are real and not imaginary. Get advice from a wise friend. Take action by writing a letter, arranging an interview. See the other side of the picture.

William Osler, the great Canadian physician, said that he was greatly helped through his life by 21 wise words of Thomas Carlyle: "Our main business is not to see what lies dimly at a distance, but to do what lies clearly at hand."

Let's take a day at a time. Cast your care on the Lord of Life, the burden bearer who really does care for you. Leave the future in God's hands.

Sounds like very good advice to me. Actually it reads a lot like what Jesus had to say in the Sermon on the Mount as recorded in Matthew's gospel. Look it up in Matthew 6:25-34. Jesus ends his discourse on worry with, "Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own." Do I hear an, AMEN?

# Dear Fellow Disciples,

I am so enjoying working on music. While my real job is engineering, I have always loved music, ever since I was a little guy — my first church music experiences were in Epworth United Methodist Church in the 60's. I loved the hymns — and they are still some of my favorites. I was a trumpet player in band in middle school, and played guitar in the 70's with all my rock and roll friends. I sang in choir when I lived in Meridianville, serving as choir director for 11 years at Meridianville Cumberland Presbyterian Church. I was a member of the Hazel Green UMC choir, and was involved in lots of music projects there. Somewhere along the way I got interested in opera and studied voice with Helen Bargetzi for many years. I sang in at least 2 operas a year for more than 10 years, and also performed as a soloist with the Huntsville Symphony Orchestra, and several musical theater shows.

Singing and music has always been a constant in my life, and I have been so very blessed in so many ways. But church is different. It is a passion that I find pretty consuming and a ministry that I am dedicated to. First Christian Church in Huntsville is my church family, and the Lord has put us all together in this place. We work together to advance God's Kingdom now in Huntsville, and I thank you for the trust you have put in me. I am so thrilled that by doing this work as a volunteer, I can say that this first year Stephanie and I, with lots of help, have donated about \$50,000 in time and talent that would otherwise have come out of the collection plate! This is such a blessing to me, and it has benefited our church greatly.

As a part of that work, Chuck Herber and I have developed and presented a proposal that would begin the process of change and provide a plan for the future direction of our congregational worship. We have shared that plan with the Worship and Building Committees of our church, and their reaction was to want the rest of you to see it and consider whether you believe God wants us to move forward with action on this plan.

The plan involves modifications to the Chancel and sanctuary that will enable us to truly support a blended worship service and attract young adults and families. It would enable us to be flexible as our future service needs change. I believe these changes are in the spirit of the "Time is Now" campaign, and will produce a lasting legacy that will reverse the downward trends in membership and attendance we have experienced over the last 10 years if we commit to it and make it happen.

Finally, I believe these changes are overdue, and we should begin to put the plan in place as soon as practical, to take advantage of the resources and dedication of our current membership, while trying to attract a new generation of Disciples. We can do this and still preserve the existing traditions and spirit of our worship service. I am offering to present this proposal several times in the next few weeks so that we can talk about it together, ask questions, and discuss choices that we face together. I am considering the Sunday School time, and perhaps one Saturday and an evening some time. You will see some sketches made from the concept models that I developed of our sanctuary that reflect ideas about changes to truly expand worship to the next generations. I pray that God would guide our discourse on the important choices facing us, and that His hand would direct our paths. Please watch for announcements of the presentations, and let me know if you have comments or questions. Thank you and please be in prayer for our church family!
