HOLY WEEK MAUNDY-THURSDAY COMMUNION

This Thursday evening, April 13, is Maundy-Thursday and we will be having a very special Holy Communion and Tenebrae Service at 7:00 p.m. Perhaps you are wondering what "maundy" and "tenebrae" mean. They are from Latin; "maundy" means commandment and "tenebrae" means darkness. The evening worship celebration is called Maundy-Thursday because Jesus on the Thursday, before his death on Good Friday, was in the upper room with his disciples and commanded them (and us) to, "Do this in remembrance of me." The command is to break bread and share in the cup of redemption doing so in remembrance of him and his sacrifice.

The special service this Thursday is called "Tenebrae" because of the symbolism involved in the worship experience. During the service the contrast is made between Jesus, who is the light of the world, and evil, symbolized by darkness, that cannot defeat it. The Communion Tenebrae service is one of my favorite worship services of the Christian year.

Thursday night we will hear the story of Jesus' life and ministry recognizing him as the light of the world. On the communion table we will light the Christ candle and then 12 more candles symbolizing Jesus' 12 disciples. We will hear read directly from scripture some stories of Jesus' life, teaching, ministry, miracles, and climactically the scene of the last supper with Jesus and his disciples in the upper room.

We will celebrate the Lord's Supper together as we come forward to receive the elements. Toward the end of the service the 12 disciple candles are extinguished one at a time remembering how the disciples abandon Jesus. Finally, a taper will be lit with the light of Christ and the light leaves the sanctuary. We are left in a dimly lit room standing in darkness (tenebrae) symbolizing the death of Jesus. It truly is a very moving experience to hear the story, feel the emotions, and see the symbolism of light with the contrasting darkness.

I love the Lord's Supper and I love how, as Disciples of Christ, we celebrate it weekly. It appears to me that in scripture the early church practiced weekly communion. They met on the first day of the week, Sunday, and the book of Acts tells us (2:42), "And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." To that I say, "Amen." This next first day of the week is Easter and a very special day it is! Come to church and celebrate the love of God who conquered the darkness of death by the resurrection of Jesus, our Lord, and savior! Hallelujah!
