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WEEDS OR WHEAT?

The last two weeks the gospel lectionary readings have focused on stories about sowing seed and about wheat. Growing up in North Carolina I never really thought about wheat. I simply was not the major crop in our area. No one I knew grew wheat in their backyard garden and even on the farmland my Grandfather's family owned in Illinois they grew corn and soybeans. Wheat was something bread was made out of, I knew this because it had a picture of wheat on the package.

Then we moved to Kansas, and I learned a great about wheat. I remember my father telling me that Wichita was surrounded by seas of wheat. I loved the beach as a child, but I did not know to interpret this image until I saw the fields. They were huge, acres upon acres of wheat some stretching out as far as the eye could see. When the wind blew the stalks would rustle making a quiet noise that reminded me of the waves coming in and out.

It was also amazing to me that often farmers would often let weeds, those plants they did not want, grow in amongst the wheat. Weeds have always been a problem. The U.S. Department of Agriculture admits that over 50% of our flora is made up of species that are considered undesirable by some segment of society. Weeds are a part of life. When you have a home garden it is easy to spend a few moments picking them, but when you have hundreds, if not thousands of acres, it is impossible.

This week Jesus tells a parable about planting and sowing. Like us, the servants are eager to go pull up all of the weeds, but the landowner does not want to harm the good wheat, so he tells them to leave the weeds alone. They will be taken care of after the harvest. Jesus equates the weeds to those that do evil in the world, while the good seed represents the children of the Kingdom of God, but what happens when a weed becomes wheat?

When I read this passage I was reminded of Dandelions. Most of us consider this plant to be a weed, something to pull out of our yards and dispose of before they take over. Yet, in the past, people actually cultivated Dandelions. The leaves, stalk, and flowers are all edible. They can be used to make tea or even wine. The roots have been used for medicine for years to treat stomach and liver conditions. Dandelions fell out of fashion when people wanted nice green lawns filled with grass. They became a weed in our minds, not a helpful plant.

This reminds me that we have to be careful with our labels, just as we have to be very cautious when we want to decide who is welcome in our community. Maybe this is a reminder that you and I are not to judge. Perhaps we simply do not have the ability to discern the good and the bad for everyone. Notice that it is the Son of Man, Jesus, who not only sows the good seed but also decides what is wheat and what is a weed. This does not mean that we have no responsibilities. We are called to be the ones that grow, the ones that share, and the people that produce the love of God in the world. Even in the midst of the weeds there can be light and life. Therefore, let us have faith and let that faith take root, for the harvest will come. Thanks be to God, Amen.

Social grievance and angry protests across the country. School systems thrown into quandary over online leaning. Stagnant business operations and economic growth. Racial tensions at boiling levels. Political polarization and personal stress. Over-zealous policing and under-funded mental health resources. Mounting pressures imposed by an unabated pandemic. Social malaise spiraling upwards.

The daily disruptions we encounter are more than just disquieting. They run deep and shake the institutional foundations that once constituted our social order. The Coronavirus and the virulent strife over longstanding racial injustice have upended the world as we once knew it.
