#### **WELCOMING OTHERS TO THE TABLE**

When I was growing up one of the rules set by my parents was that, if at all possible, we would sit down and have our evening meal together. Our family dinners were times to relax, talk about our day, make plans for the days ahead, and remember that we were a family. My parents also enjoyed having dinner parties and so we would invite friends, neighbors, and co-workers to our home quite often. My father would cook, sometimes making lavish meals, and we would spend hours eating and talking, building the bonds of friendship, sharing dreams, and sometimes the pain of reality. I loved those meals, and not just because my father was a great cook. I enjoyed the conversations. My parents always made sure I was a part of the discussion, if I minded my manners and did not try to dominate the conversation. I learned a great deal from the people who were invited to our table, lessons that I have kept to this day.

On September 5<sup>th</sup> our congregation began a new tradition on Wednesday night. We have been hosting a meal and I am incredibly pleased by its success. We arrive around 5:30 pm and get in line to enter the kitchen. Yolanda is there serving the food she has prepared with a smile on her face and then we sit together in McMains Hall, eating and talking, the kind of fellowship that helps relationships grow. If you have seen me at these dinners you can tell that I am always one of the last in line, an old habit I picked up in my first church. I do this so I can see who is here and I usually look for a person who might not have anyone to sit with, but so far I have not found anyone, so I join a table and the discussion. Thank you to everyone who has attended, set up the rooms, bought or made food, helped to clean up, or in any way have helped to make these dinners a success.

Everyone is welcome at these Wednesday Dinners just as everyone is welcome at the communion table on Sunday. As Disciples sometimes we have been called "the people of the table" because of the importance of communion to our denomination. Just as family dinners are meaningful to my relatives so too is the family dinner we have on Sunday important to our congregation. It is a meal of remembrance, a time of thanksgiving, an opportunity to confess our brokenness and let go of our burdens, and a time of encouragement so that we might continue to welcome others into God's great family. Like our family dinners, the meal is more than the elements of bread and wine, communion is a way of connecting with God and with one another.

I hope that in the weeks ahead that you might welcome someone to have a meal with you. Invite your family to come together, welcome a neighbor or a friend, perhaps you can invite them to our Wednesday Night Dinners or to our services on Sunday. Whatever the case may be, when we eat together we open ourselves to conversations, new ideas, and new relationships and we let others know of the love and grace of God that we feel each and every day. Welcome someone to the table of the Lord because there is always space.
