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Why I Support the Reconciliation Offering by Rev. John P. Mobley Regional Minister

I want to invite each of you to consider your own support of the 2019 Reconciliation Offering. The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) has set aside this annual offering for nearly 50 years to address racism and its impacts on the world, the nation, and even the church. The Church sees racism as an issue of faith and it calls on people of faith to stand up and be counted among those who are willing to work for unity and reconciliation. Disciples claim to be "a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world." Supporting the Reconciliation Offering is one way to express one's own commitment to wholeness within the human family.

The basic impact of racism is that it divides us and limits our ability to see our brothers and sisters. Racism is a lie that began to be told as European expansion was reaching its peak. Racism resulted in centuries of privilege for some and hardship for others. Racism breeds attitudes of superiority and inferiority, even to this day. With all of this as background, I ask myself: Why do I support the Reconciliation Offering?

I support the Reconciliation Offering because it supports ministries that bring people into relationship. The surest way to be divided is to remain strangers to each other. When we are in relationship with people who do not share our ethnic or cultural background, we begin to understand that, although we are different in some ways, we have much more in common. We want basically the same things in life. We share ambitions for our children. We desire joy and fulfillment in life. As Christians, we love Jesus and want to serve God with faithfulness.

In our Region, Reconciliation funds have made it possible for racially diverse congregations to be in relationship. Funds have been used to encourage congregations to join together for combined activities where there are many opportunities for relationship-building. Scholarships have been provided to encourage full participation at Regional events for persons who would not have been able to attend an event due to cost.

I also support the Reconciliation Offering because I believe the church must come to a more full understanding of racism, its origins, and how it continues to work to divide people today. Both the General church and the Regional church are involved in ant-racism training. This training, which the Reconciliation Offering supports, is critically important for leaders who want to be part of "a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world."

I support the Reconciliation Offering because I love the whole church. I have grown in my appreciation for persons of different ethnic and cultural backgrounds. By pursuing authentic relationships across racial lines, I believe my life is enriched.
